#### ABRAHAM LINCOLN BIRTHDAY CEREMONY, WASHINGTON, D.C.

An Abraham Lincoln Birthday Ceremony was held at the Lincoln Monument in Washington, DC, on February 12, 2015. Peter Dixon of the Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States (MOLLUS) led the Ceremony. The event involved ceremonial wreath placements including those by the Allied Orders of the Grand Army of the Republic. Ann Lewis, Washington D.C. Representative, placed the wreath for the ASUVCW. Rosemary Martin, as a National ASUVCW Personal Aide, represented National ASUVCW President Rachelle Campbell as well as the ASUVCW Department of California and Pacific.

#### MEDAL OF HONOR CEREMONY, ANTIETAM NATIONAL BATTLEFIELD

On Saturday, March 28, 2015, SUVCW Antietam Camp No. 3, Department of the Chesapeake, conducted their 7th Annual Medal of Honor Ceremony at the Antietam National Battlefield in Sharpsburg, Maryland. The Camp holds this ceremony in alignment with the National Medal of Honor Day. This year Antietam Camp No. 3 honored 20 Union soldiers who were awarded the Medal of Honor for action during the Battle of Antietam on September 17th 1862.

The opening ceremony was held at the Dunker Church. Camp Senior Vice Commander Tommy Chapman organized the activity. Camp Junior Vice Commander Stuart Younkin and Camp Commander Karl Woodcock led the ceremony. Many

attended the ceremony, including representatives of two U.S. Senators, a representative from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, SUVCW Senior Vice Commander-in-Chief Eugene Mortorff, SUVCW Department Commander Robert Pollock, and SUVCW

National Chief of Staff, Kevin Martin. The Gettysburg Blues, led by SUVCW National Color Bearer Justin Dorsey, provided the Honor Guard.

Following the Medal of Honor Ceremony, memorial tributes were given and wreaths were placed at the Maryland Monument. ASUVCW National Personal Aide Rosemary Martin presented a wreath on behalf of ASUVCW National President Rachelle Campbell. Sister Rosemary also represented the Department of California and Pacific, and Sister Barbara Day represented the Department of the Chesapeake, when each placing a dozen live red roses with red, white, and blue ribbons, at the foot of the monument.



#### The Mantle of Charity

We hear a lot about Fraternity, Charity, and Loyalty; they are key principles that unite the Allied Orders. In recent years, however, we seem to have mislaid the "mantle of charity." Sometimes also referred to as the "veil of charity," the mantle of charity gives us clear instructions on how to apply Fraternity, Charity, and Loyalty to our activities within our respective organizations and between the Allied Orders.

The Grand Army of the Republic understood that, with any group of individuals, passions and tempers can grow hot. Reading the proceedings of their annual encampments gives you a taste of the fighting temper and spirit that remained in these Veterans, long after their days of battle. In some instances, men were physically restrained before punches were thrown within the meeting room. Yet, it was tacitly understood by all that what happened in the meeting stayed in the meeting room. After the business session, the men would renew the fraternal bonds around the campfire, to recall what had joined them together in the first place. Those bonds were stronger than any personal difference of opinion.

When I joined the Daughters almost twenty-five years ago, I was struck immediately by one passage within the initiation ritual. When dealing with another member of the Order, I was instructed to "Always throw the mantle of charity over her words and deeds, making them appear in the best light possible." Not an easy concept to put into practice, but vital in the workings of Fraternity, Charity, and Loyalty. The Grand Army members were keenly familiar with this mantle of charity, and that was what enabled them to put aside their differences at the end of the day. In 1881, when the Aaron Wilkes Post 23, Department of New Jersey, visited Richmond, Virginia as the guests of "The Old First Virginia Infantry," they encountered some among the Southern citizens who were



less than gracious. In the book documenting their trip, the authors chose to throw the "kindly veil of charity" over all those who were not in sympathy with the spirit of their reception.

In the past five years, I personally have seen many instances where personal arguments have threatened the organization on every level, from the local camp, tent, circle, auxiliary or corps, to the department, and even the national. Instead of working together to do the true work of the Orders, we have divided ourselves, seeking to press charges at every turn against anyone who doesn't do things the way "we" think they should. I have seen the division between those who reenact and those who don't cause our organizations on the local level to collapse. Good people are turned away or turned off by the bickering among us, and that could be the sounding of the death knell for our orders.

The mantle of charity allows us to overlook the faults and differences of others, so that we can practice true fraternal charity. They are our sisters and brothers-- how can we exhibit the true ties that bind us all together while harboring anger or resentment in our hearts toward them? We can't. But, by wrapping this figurative mantle of charity around them like a cloak, we may overlook the unpleasantness and embrace our siblings. Perhaps the image of the veil is easier to understand in this case. A veil changes the way we see things- it doesn't change what was said or done, merely our perceptions of it.

None of us are perfect, and there are times when the best of us forget this directive. Even today, the passions and fighting spirit of our ancestors flow through our veins. But, we must never forget that, at the end of the day, we are all united working hard to preserve the memory of the "Boys who wore the Blue."

### Historian's Reflections

#### FRATERNITY, CHARITY, LOYALTY

These three simple words defined the principles of the Grand Army of the Republic. These three words served as their motto. Hearing these three words, kindled the spirit of greatness and was breathed into the Allied Orders by inheritance.

**FRATERNITY** refers to the brotherhood our Civil War ancestors felt toward the men with whom they served. It was because of the great dedication of their patriotism that we set aside days of remembrance to perpetuate their heroic deeds, sacrifices, and the preservation of our nation – especially Memorial Day, Lincoln's Birthday, Lincoln's Death Day, and Appomattox Day.

CHARITY refers to The Grand Army of the Republic adopting their principles from President Lincoln's second inaugural address, "to bind up the Nation's wounds, and to care for him who shall have borne the battle, and for his widow and orphan." The many works our members do to ensure the principles of caring for the needy veteran, widow, and family members are addressed as well as keeping the memory of our Civil War veterans true through teaching U.S. Civil War history, marking, decorating, and maintaining Civil War headstones, monuments and battle sites.



Those three words offer each of us the opportunity to participate in our Order to conduct the many needed services of our nation in the name of our organization. How have you participated in this venture? Have you visited a veteran, dropped off personal items at a Veterans Administration hospital, cleaned a cemetery, laid a wreath at a veteran's grave, maintained a Civil War monument, fed a homeless veteran and his or her family, mailed in coupons for soldiers to use while serving, created a quilt, blanket, pillow case, or care package to send to a serving soldier? Have you come up with other ideas and acted upon them? Have you helped our National Patriotic Instructor and Chief of Staff raise money this year? They have an incredible task of earning thousands, not hundreds of dollars, to support our organization. Through the years, our Sisters have stepped up and have been counted on to aid both the Order and our needy veteran. As a member, what will be your legacy?

#### **MEMBERSHIP**

Membership in Auxiliary to Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War can be obtained through eligibility in several ways:

- 1. Women who are lineal or collateral descendants, of soldiers, sailors or marines regularly mustered and honorably discharged from the Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States of America during the War of the Rebellion 1861-1865. Daughter, granddaughter, granddaughter, niece, grandniece, etc., & legally adopted daughters qualify.
- 2. Mothers, wives, widows, daughters & legally adopted daughters of Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War in good standing. (Not Associates)
- 3. Associate Memberships: Available to women who do not qualify through heredity, #1 & #2 above, who demonstrate a genuine interest in the Civil War and can subscribe to the purpose and objects of the Auxiliary. An Associate may vote and hold any office except that of National Vice-President and National President. Associates may not exceed one-third of the total membership of the Auxiliary at the time of election.
- 4. Junior Membership: For young ladies of not less than six (6) years of age.
