Happy Spring, dear Sisters and those reading this Auxiliary to Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (ASUVCW) Newsletter!



Stephenson Ceremony in Petersburg, Illinois

On April 6, 1866, a Menard County surgeon created the Grand Army of the Republic, a support group for Union veterans of the Civil War.

Almost 159 years to the day, people gathered Saturday at the grave-site of Dr. Benjamin Franklin Stephenson to honor his legacy of service to thousands of veterans and their successors.

Stephenson is buried at Rose Hill Cemetery, just east of Petersburg on Illinois 123.

The Grand Army of the Republic was the nation's first and largest veterans organization.

Shortly after President Lincoln's assassination, Henry Ward Beecher, famous pastor of Plymouth Church, Brooklyn, New York, paid a tribute which speaks prophetically of this historic Lincoln site:

"Four years ago, O Illinois, we took from your midst an untried man and from among the people. We return him to you a mighty conquerer. Not thine any more, but the nation's; not ours, but the world's. Give him place, O ye prairies. In the midst of this great continent his dust shall rest, a sacred treasure to myriads who shall pilgrim to that shrine to kindle anew their zeal and patriotism."

A similar sentiment was voiced by Dr. Phineas D. Gurley, pastor of the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church in Washington, DC.

My sisters and I enjoyed the joyful music and songs during the Easter service, but had limited understanding of that day's importance.

Truthfully our thoughts drifted to wanting to get back home to play with the Easter basket toys of bubbles and sidewalk chalk. But that had to wait until Grandma came

over to eat the Easter ham dinner with all the special side dishes. Of course we would sneak some jelly beans, marshmallow chicks, and a couple Hershey mini-eggs from our Easter baskets while the kitchen table extension panel was put in the middle.

Mom then handed us her linen tablecloth and napkins to put on the larger table along with the 'formal' dinnerware she had purchased with S&H green stamps. We were warned to handle these plates with utmost care; this particular design with yellow flowers and metallic gold rims was no longer available!

What strange memories of a special religious day that is meant to highlight the wonderful story of Jesus's redeeming His sinful people. It took two years of Bible study at my Lutheran day school before I understood the deeper meaning of Holy Week and Easter. I was shy attending the Lutheran day school at first, but soon I felt comfortable and happy I had grown in my relationship with Jesus.

Bible study enables us to take 'baby steps' in our religious growth. Consider "The Gospel in a Nutshell"—"*For God so loved the world, He gave His only Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life.*" John 3:16 is a great reminder that our redemption was so important to God.

AND the cost was Jesus's life. In Hebrews 10:10 ... "we have been sanctified through the offering of the body and blood of Jesus Christ, for once and for all." Wow! I have pondered that many times when the choir sings Amazing Grace, Oh Sacred Head Now Wounded, and When I Survey the Wondrous Cross. Saving us was so costly—wounds, deep pain, anguish, having his body lie in a tomb until He rose from the dead--Jesus loves us so very much!

During Good Friday, we pondered how deep is Jesus' love is for us. What wondrous love; how did He endure it all? He endured because he values us and wants us to be with Him when our tasks on earth are done.

What can we do to repay His love? Because we are human, we could never do enough. Jesus was asked when He was on earth what the 'greatest commandment' was. In Mark 12:33-34, Jesus replied..."love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, and with all your strength...and love your neighbor as yourself."

That surely is the "greatest commandment"— and a very tough one to follow without asking God's help. I will have to pray constantly...

Memorial Day

When the May has called her flowers, for the summer waiting long,

It is fitting that we hold Memorial Day sacred. Let every member of the Auxiliary to the Sons of Union Veterans set themselves among those, who, by their living each day, prove to Our Hero Dead, we are what they would have us be, in action, deed, and conduct.

Auxiliaries should hold Memorial Services for deceased members the meeting prior to Memorial Day.

Annual Installation Forms (AO1) were due to the National Secretary by January 30, 2025. Please file as soon as possible.

Annual Reports (AO2) were due to the National Secretary by April 1, 2025. These should include your Per Capita Tax checks made out to the: National Organization ASUVCW and an up to date Roster. Per Capita Tax/dues is \$15.00 per member. Instructions for the Roster are on page four of form AO1.

Form 990N should be filed with the IRS (Internal Revenue Service by May 15th. A receipt should be printed after completion and sent to the National Secretary.

Subordinate Auxiliary forms AO4 (Auxiliary Treasurer), AO5 (Auxiliary Vice President, AO6 (Auxiliary Chaplain), AO7 (Auxiliary Patriotic Instructor) and AO8 (Auxiliary Assets) should be filed by June 15 (to accommodate the need for information from Memorial Day), to the National Secretary. She will disperse them to the various National Officers so that they can compile their reports for National Encampment.

Form A10 is for our Charitable Deeds for work done the previous year. Please submit this with the above forms.

Also, the Auxiliary-at-Large President should submit a President's Report to president@asuvcw.org.

Remembrance and honor are at the heart of our Auxiliary's core values; remembering and honoring our Union Veterans of the Civil War is the main reason we exist. The choices we have to fulfill this duty are various and numerous.

My husband and I were new members of Austin Blair #7 in 2015. Since we were just starting other Austin Blair members, June and Howard Lloyd, befriended us and we traveled with them to the Eaton Rapids GAR Hall and Museum presentations and participated in some wreath ceremonies and



headstone dedications.

Howard Lloyd had an ancestor that was killed coming home after the Civil War on the Sultana Steamboat. He, June, and other family members who were part of Austin Blair #7 had joined the Sultana Association of Descendants and Friends. They gave us some beginning knowledge of the Sultana Disaster that happened in April 1865. We decided to join our friends and travel to Tennessee to participate in a Sultana monument rededication.

The night before the rededication, we attended a meeting in the basement of the church's cemetery where the monument was placed 100 years before. It was so interesting meeting the Sultana descendants and hearing their ancestors' histories. They helped us understand how important it was to learn about the Sultana and teach others to remember the largest maritime catastrophe that killed many Union Soldiers who were just recently released from Confederate prison camps.

This was the beginning of our thirst for knowledge about the Civil War. Without the mentorship of our Sons and Auxiliary members, we probably wouldn't have participated in honoring our Civil War Veterans service with the Camp and Auxiliary.

I encourage all of you to mentor and support others that need a boost when starting in our Auxiliary. A person who finds what is of interest in the history of the Civil War veterans will be willing to then, in turn, mentor and support others!

National Patriotic Instructor

Did you know there was a Battle of Fort Myers in Florida? This past February 20, they celebrated their 160th anniversary. On the morning of February 20, 1865, in Fort Myers, the Confederate Cattle Guard Battalion (aka "The Cow Cavalry"), fired a warning shot from their cannon and demanded an unconditional surrender of the Union occupation of Fort Myers. Union Commanding Officer, Capt. James Doyle, refused and the battle ensued. The Battle lasted until sunset resulting in only one casualty. The Union won. During the Civil War, Union Troops often confiscated cattle from Florida ranches to stop the beef shipments that were feeding the Confederates.

I had the honor of attending Florida's SUVCW Department Encampment in Fort Myers on March 1, and enjoyed learning all about this battle and how active the Sons are in Florida. To date, there is no Auxiliary in Florida; however, that is about to change! I have six applications so far and look forward to getting

a charter before the year ends.

On March 29, National Vietnam War Veterans Day, I went to visit Larry Charles Bolyard, who was killed in action in Vietnam and is buried at Manasota Memorial Cemetery in Bradenton, Florida.

Larry was only 29 years old when he was killed on April 28, 1968, in Quang Tri Province, South Vietnam. He received the Silver Star, the Bronze Star, the Air Medal and the Purple Heart. He left behind a wife and three small children. Many comments are left on his find-a-grave site; here's just a sample from his Nam-Bandof-Brothers: "May God allow you to read this, and may He allow me to someday shake your hand when I get to Heaven to personally thank you." "Watch over the U.S.A. It still needs your courage."

A Long Journey Home – 1st Lt. Michael Blassie was shot down on May 11, 1972, while flying his 132nd mission to South Vietnam. His remains, ID card, dog tags, a family picture and part of his flight suit were wrapped by Captain William Parnell and sent to a Saigon mortuary. In Hawaii, they were accidentally misclassified as "unknown." Michael's unidentified remains were designated as the Vietnam Unknown Soldier at a Pearl Harbor ceremony in 1984. President Reagan presided over his funeral, and his remains lay in the Tomb of the Unknown until 1998. After retired Colonel Parnell related his story of wrapping Michael's remains to his sister, Patricia Blassie, Michael's remains were exhumed in 1998. DNA testing proved with certainty that it was Michael Blassie, and on June 30, 1998, the Defense Department announced that the Vietnam Unknown Soldier had been identified.

Michael's family requested his remains be transported home to St. Louis and reinterred at Jefferson Barracks National Cemetery with full military honors. Janet Paschall (well-known gospel vocalist) performed *Another Soldier's Coming Home* during his service.

The Vietnam crypt remains vacant.

UPCOMING DAYS TO REMEMBER:



April 19 – Patriots' Day - 250th Anniversary of Lexington & Concord

On the 19th of April at 6:00 a.m., the British troops marched in to seize weapons from the Colonists. They met 77 Colonists who had gathered on Lexington Green led by Captain John Parker.

Capt. John Parker was a woodworker by trade. He was 46 years old at this time, and he was suffering from tuberculosis. Upon hearing that the British were on the move from Boston to Concord, Parker, in his weakened condition, walked two miles to Lexington Green to take command of the militia

men who had responded to the alarm. It was here that Parker said to his men, "Stand your ground. Don't fire unless fired upon, but if they mean to have a war, let it begin here."

The 700 well-armed, well-trained British soldiers were led by British Officer Major John Pitcairn. When Pitcairn saw Parker's militia waiting on the Green, he yelled to them: "Throw down your arms, ye villains, ye rebels." Both Pitcairn and Parker gave orders not to fire, but even though we still don't know who fired it, "The Shot Heard Round the World" was fired, and then both sides engaged in battle, starting the American Revolution.

May 26 – Memorial Day – On Memorial Day, at 3:00 p.m., Americans pause to remember those who died in service to the United States, often through the sounding of "Taps."

"Taps" was created by General Daniel Butterfield who thought the "lights out" signal was too formal to signal the day's end. In July, 1862, Gen. Butterfield wrote a 24-note sequence we know as "Taps." It was guickly adopted by all Union camps and even spread to the Confederate camps. It was officially recognized by the U.S. Army in 1874, and its use at military funerals has become a standard. In 2013, Congress designated "Taps" as the nation's official song of remembrance.

There are two monuments in Virginia commemorating Taps. The first is the Taps Monument located at Beverly Plantation where General Butterfield composed the tune, and the other is the Taps window in the Chapel of the Centurion at Fort Monroe.

or phone call away from an answer.



Seraph Young Ford Auxiliary #47 Utah

On Saturday, February 22, 2025, at Signature Books in Salt Lake City, Utah, Auxiliary-at-Large Seraph Young Ford #47 was instituted.
