November 11, 2021 - Veterans Day, originally known as Armistice Day, first was celebrated in 1921 to honor those who served in World War I. President Eisenhower changed the name to Veterans Day in 1954 in order to honor those who served and died in all wars. The day was chosen because fighting in World War I ceased on November 11, 1918 at 11:11 a.m. To this day, communities around the world observe a moment of silence at 11:11 a.m. on this holiday.

November 25, 2021 - Thanksgiving has been celebrated in our country since 1621 when the Pilgrims and Native Americans came together to celebrate an abundant harvest. Sarah Josepha Hale, an American writer and publisher, wrote to President Abraham Lincoln in 1863 requesting he declare Thanksgiving a national holiday. He did. Sarah Hale is also known for her support of education for women and girls, and for writing "Mary Had a Little Lamb."

This notates a special flag day. While flags should be flown every day in good weather, it is important to display the flag on these dates.

No matter how much our lives and our nation become stretched and strained, remembering the times during the Civil War 1861-1865, gives another view and lingering reminder of when our nation's unity hung in jeopardy. Abraham Lincoln, despite the pressures of the conflict and even when there appeared no agreeable ending, took the time to issue a proclamation of thanks and set aside a day for a National Thanksgiving.

Wishing You a Happy and Safe Thanksgiving with Lincoln's Presidential Thanksgiving Proclamation

President Abraham Lincoln's Proclamation of Thanksgiving Issued October 3, 1863

THE year that is drawing toward its close has been filled with the blessings of fruitful fields and bealthful skies. To these bounties, which are so constantly enjoyed that we are prone to forget the source from which they come, others have been added, which are of so extraordinary a nature that they cannot fail to penetrate and soften the heart which is habitually insensible to the ever-watchful providence of almighty God.

In the midst of a civil war of unequalled magnitude and severity, which has sometimes seemed to foreign states to invite and provoke their aggressions, peace has been preserved with all nations, order has been maintained, the laws have been respected and obeyed, and harmony has prevailed everywhere, except in the theater of military conflict; while that theater has been greatly contracted by the advancing armies and navies of the Union.

Needful diversions of wealth and of strength from the fields of peaceful industry to the national defense have not arrested the plow, the shuttle, or the ship; the ax has enlarged the borders of our settlements, and the mines, as well of iron and coal as of the precious metals, have yielded even more abundantly than heretofore. Population has steadily increased, notwithstanding the waste that has been made in the camp, the siege, and the battlefield; and the country, rejoicing in the consciousness of augmented strength and vigor, is permitted to expect continuance of years with large increase of freedom.

No human counsel hath devised, nor hath any mortal hand worked out these great things. They are the gracious gifts of the Most High God, who, while dealing with us in anger for our sins, hath nevertheless remembered mercy.

It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently, and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and one voice by the whole American people. I do, therefore, invite my fellow-citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next as a day of thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens. And I recommend to them that, while offering up the ascriptions justly due to him for singular deliverances and blessings, they do also, with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience, commend to his tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners, or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the almighty hand to heal the wounds of the nation, and to restore it, as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes, to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility, and union.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the city of Washington, this third day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and of the independence of the United States the eighty-eighth.


Calling all Auxiliaries, Departments, and Patriotic Instructors!



"Look...and *Be*: Making it Through the Uncertainty...Together" By Kim Villalva, National Chaplain

I have fond memories of watching Mr. Rogers' TV show as a child. He was always known for his warm smiles and kind words and stories. I love how even years later as adults we can still hear his wisdom—and when it is so very needed.

Even though we were able to come together for an "in-person" National Encampment just two months ago, we now find ourselves still surrounded by the Covid



crisis. Rising cases, overflowing hospitals, cancelled events, masked events, etc. continue in the headlines. And more and more people we know are coming down with Covid and are fighting it with differing levels of difficulty.

The chaos and stress continue. And the uncertainty. It's hard for us to know how to plan for our Auxiliary, let alone what to plan, at least in the immediate future.

65th Anniversary of the Dedication of the Albert Woolson Monument

On September 12, 1956, the Albert Woolson monument was unveiled and dedicated during the 75th National Encampment of the SUVCW and the 70th National Encampment of the ASUVCW. The bronze statue of Woolson, sculpted when he was 107, sits in a prominent spot on Hancock Avenue shaded by the trees in Ziegler's Grove. Woolson is seated on a boulder with a staff in his right hand, his campaign hat bearing the GAR emblem rests by his left hand. His membership badge is prominent on his jacket over his heart. Woolson gazes pensively toward the spot of Pickett's Charge where so many brave soldiers died on July 3, 1863.

At the dedication, Colonel Frederic Bauer, GAR Commander-in-Chief, stated: "... This statue is in many ways unique. Usually statues are dedicated to great and noble men, great military leaders, or men who have given their lives for their country. Here we have a statue of a man who was none of these things. We note that the front of the statue does not bear his name. It bears the wording 'In Memory of the Grand Army of the Republic'. Comrade Albert Woolson symbolizes all the great virtues of the common, ordinary citizen, the citizen who becomes a soldier and then returns to ordinary life."

The statue of Woolson sits atop a 6' x 7' mahogany colored, polished granite base with incised engraving.

The front of the statute reads: "Memorial to the Grand Army of the Republic". The left side of the base reads: "Senior Vice Commander in Chief of the G.A.R. Albert Woolson of Duluth, Minnesota the last survivor"

> The right side of the base reads: "Dedicated on September 12, 1956 by National Auxiliary to Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War 1861-1865"



This monument had been 20 years in the making. It had been the dream of Celeste Gentieu, who served as National President of the ASUVCW in 1931, to build a memorial to the Grand Army of the Republic. At the Fiftyfifth National ASUVCW Encampment in 1941 in Columbus, Ohio, Recommendation No. 8 was made by the National President and was

adopted "That the Permanent GAR Memorial Fund shall be reopened ... and Past National President Celeste Gentieu be appointed permanent chairman." Celeste immediately began raising money in earnest for the memorial she had long dreamed of.

The Ceremony at the Woolson Monument will take place at 11:00 am on November 20th; Hancock Avenue in Ziegler's Grove.

About the Laura Miller Award?

Maybe you knew that the The Laura Miller Award is presented by the National President or Department President to a Sister for exceptional service to the ASUVCW. The service to have occurred in a noteworthy manner at the National/Department level over an extended period of time or for an extraordinary action by a Sister. But did you know who Laura Miller was? Thank you to PCinC Steve Michaels (with research assistance from PDC Kent Peterson and PDC Robert Wolz) for the following article.

Laura Florence Martin was born May 10, 1864, in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, the daughter of David N. Martin, a rope maker, and Kate Hubert. She had a younger brother, William.

During the Civil War, David had served in Company A, 122nd Pennsylvania Volunteers (9 mos.) from August 11, 1862 to May 15, 1863. He took part in the defense of Washington, the Battles of Fredericksburg and Chancellorsville.

19-year old Laura was reportedly head of the few Ladies Aid Societies, associated with the Eastern Pennsylvania Sons of Veterans in 1883. When the Eastern Pennsylvania Ladies Aid Societies met in Lancaster in 1883, they decided to accompany their Sons organization when it affiliated with A.P. Davis' organization. Laura then became the provisional National President of the new Ladies Aid Society, which had a crude organization and lacked system.



Laura's father died of a stroke on September 17, 1884, just weeks after the Sons of Veterans officially recognized and acknowledged the Ladies Aid Societies as the

auxiliary to the Sons of Veterans, U.S.A. By this time, the new Order consisted of seven chapters, all in eastern Pennsylvania.

Just shy of her 21st birthday in 1885, Laura was installed as president of Ladies Aid Society #7 at the Admiral Reynolds GAR Post 405 hall in Lancaster. The local society was mustered in with 25 sisters, under the auspices of the Sons of Veterans' George H. Thomas Camp 19.

The following month, the LAS #7 held a 3-day fair and festival at Lancaster's Roberts Hall. President Laura Martin was Superintendent and General Manager. Three tables, each representing the Sons of Veterans, the Ladies Aid Society, and the Grand Army of the Republic, were manned by the ladies of the society. They respectively featured confections, flowers and cakes, were presumably were sold for the support of each of the organizations.

There followed many years of activity within the Ladies Aid Society. Laura married Charles Miller in 1913. Mr. and Mrs. Miller moved to Atlantic City, New Jersey, where they lived until about 1929. Laura joined the city's chapter of the Eastern Star.

In April 1926, she began being attended to by a doctor, as she had been diagnosed with breast cancer and other ailments. She refused to be operated upon. In declining health, Charles and Laura returned to Lancaster in 1929 and lived with Laura's sister-in-law. Charles died on June 19, at age 74, and Laura died later that year, on November 19, at age 67. She was buried next to her husband in the Lancaster Cemetery.

In 2019, The National Auxiliary to the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War instituted the Laura Miller Award, presented by the National President or Department President to a Sister for exceptional service to the ASUVCW. The service needs to have occurred in a noteworthy manner at the National/Department level over an extended period of time or for an extraordinary action by a Sister. 7

Davis Award is presented by the National President or Department President to a Brother of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War for exemplifying the same type of unselfish service, support, encouragement and respect for the ASUVCW as was demonstrated by A.P. Davis during the formative years of the Auxiliary. This year's recipients were: PCinC Steve Michaels and PCP Missouri, Christopher Warren. SUMMARY OF ACTIONS AT THE NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT

ST. LOUIS, MISSOURI AUGUST 5-8, 2021

From the notes of the National Secretary

From National President Wanda Langdon's Report:

- 1. Restore the National Treasurer position to a 5-year term. Passed
- 2. Re-create the National Membership at Large Coordinator position with changes to the job description. **Passed**
- 3. Include the General and Special Orders issued during the administration in the Proceedings for that year. **Passed**
- 4. Add language into the CR&Rs to cover electronic and hybrid meetings. Passed
- 5. Require all Departments and Auxiliaries to update their Bylaws to add language covering the use of electronic and hybrid meetings. **Passed**
- 6. Increase National yearly per capita dues to \$12. Passed
- 7. Establish a mentoring team utilizing our PNPs. Passed
- 8. Create a Graves Registration Director as an appointed position. Passed
- 9. That appropriate regulations be adopted to allow a Department President or National President to suspend Auxiliaries and Departments for failure to pay per capita dues and/or file the required forms/reports on time and in a completed format. **Failed**

From Vice President Allison Pollitt's report:

- 1. Reinstating the National Membership at Large Coordinator position. **Duplication of National President's Recommendation #2 – already addressed.**
- 2. That the National recruiting pamphlet be updated and revised. Passed
- 3. That a brochure template be created and adopted for any Auxiliary/Department to assist in the muchneeded area of recruitment. **Passed**
- 4. That the Supply Officer keep a supply of brochures. Failed

From Historian Danielle Michael's report:

- 1. That the National President provide a biography to be posted in her proceedings with her picture. **Passed**
- 2. That the living PNPs provide a biography to the Historian for our records. Passed

From Supply Officer Judy Morgan's report:

1. That the Standing Order of taking 25% of the total sales of the Supply Officer and dividing it between the scholarship and a veteran's organization of the Supply Officer's choice be discontinued. **Passed**

From the National Patriotic Instructor Kim Villalva's report:

- 1. Create a National Patriotic Education Program for the Auxiliary to Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. Failed
- 2. Create a Patriotic Education Committee. Failed
- 3. Re-evaluate the effectiveness of the Auxiliary's Patriotic Instructor Report (A07) Form. Passed

From the National Auxiliary Female Veteran Liaison Officer Susan Fallon:

1. That the provided form be approved and on the website for any veteran to use to obtain a veteran's pin. **Passed Michigan Department:**

1. That the free Life Membership age be dropped from 90 to 85. Passed

2. Let us welcome into the ASUVCW any non-United States citizen Sisters that have direct United States Civil War Veteran ancestral lineage. They will have the same rights as the Auxiliary Sisters that are United States citizens with the exception of holding the offices of Auxiliary National Vice President, National President, and National Treasurer. Otherwise, without direct ancestral lineage to a U.S. Civil War veteran, they can join with the same privileges as an ASUVCW Associate member. **Passed**

Gov. Isaac Stevens Auxiliary #1, WA:

1. That the Articles of Incorporation as amended in 1904, 1926, 1972, and 1977 be included in the next edition of the Constitution, Rules and Regulations (CRR). **Passed**

Pennsylvania Department:

1. That the National Organization create a cemetery marker for deceased members of the Auxiliary. We also recommend that the National Organization create a cemetery marker for nurses and other women who served the cause during the Civil War. Not approved as written. That the National President work with the Sons to develop grave markers for Auxiliary members. Passed

2. That the National Organization review the requirements of full membership to ADD the descendants of Civil War nurses and other women who served during the war. **Failed**

National Special Committee on ASUVCW Logo, Emblem Usage & Style Guide

1. That a mold be created of an ASUVCW grave marker similar to those of the past and be available for purchase for a member's grave. **Referred to the National President.**
