

April 16, 2022 – 2022 Lincoln Tomb Ceremony



On April 14, 1865 Abraham Lincoln, the 16th president of the United States, was assassinated by stage actor John Wilkes Booth while attending the play *Our American Cousin* at Ford's Theatre in Washington, D.C. Shot in the head as he watched the play, Lincoln died the following day, April 15, 1865 at 7:22 AM, in the Petersen House opposite the theater. He was the first U.S. president to be assassinated, with his funeral and burial marking an extended period of national mourning.

All are invited to participate in the 66th Annual Lincoln Tomb Ceremony, sponsored by the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW) and the Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States (MOLLUS), commemorating the 157th Anniversary of President Lincoln's death. It will be held at the Lincoln Tomb in Oak Ridge Cemetery in Springfield, IL at 10 AM on Saturday, April 16, 2022.

April 27, 2022 – Ulysses S. Grant's 200th Birthday

Hiram Ulysses Grant was born April 27, 1822, in Point Pleasant, Ohio, the first child of Jesse and Hannah Grant. Most people know Ulysses S. Grant as the nation's highest ranking general during the American Civil War and a two-term 18th president during the Reconstruction Era. He was also a loving husband, devoted father to four children, and a man dedicated to his country and the ideals of a More Perfect Union. Grant is one of the most important figures of 19th Century U.S. history. His legacy is complex, remarkable, and inspiring.

Ulysses S. Grant's achievements during the Civil War were nothing less than spectacular. Having resigned his commission in 1854 and returned to

his family at White Haven, MO, Grant re-entered the army in 1861 as a colonel of the Twenty-first Illinois Volunteer Infantry Regiment. Grant offered his services to the U.S. military and quickly rose to fame following his victories at Forts Henry and Donelson, where he earned the nickname "Unconditional Surrender" Grant. Largely through successive victories by the troops under his command, he rose steadily in rank until he commanded all Union land forces. Grant received a commission as Lieutenant General, which was presented to him by President Abraham Lincoln on March 10, 1864, shortly after Congress had revived the rank at Lincoln's request. Only two men, George Washington and Winfield Scott had held the rank before Grant, and Scott's commission was by brevet. With this appointment, Grant essentially replaced his former nemesis, Gen. Henry W. Halleck, as "General in Chief of the Army" and was subject only to Lincoln as commander in chief. Well-respected by troops and civilians, Grant earned Lincoln's trust and went on to force Robert E. Lee's surrender at Appomattox in 1865. (continued on page 8)

LINCOLN'S BIRTHDAY CEREMONY AT LINCOLN MEMORIAL

February 12, 2022, Washington, D.C. Under the National Park Service, the Lincoln Birthday National Commemorative Committee, and the Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States, the 213th Anniversary of President Abraham Lincoln's birth was marked by a traditional wreath laying ceremony at the Lincoln Memorial, celebrating its centennial year this year.

There are 58 steps leading up to the Lincoln Memorial, said to be two for the number of terms he served as President, and 56 for his age when he was assassinated. There are 87 total steps from the reflecting pool to Abraham Lincoln's Statue, equal to "Four score and seven years" from Lincoln's famous Gettysburg Address. Due to a non-operational elevator, the ceremony took place at the platform at the steps this year, then the wreaths were moved to the Lincoln Memorial Statue.

On March 26, 2022, 175 guests attended "A Tribute to Ohio Women in the Military Luncheon Honoring Women Veterans from Southwest Ohio" that was co-sponsored by Children's Historical

Publishing and the Dayton Woman's Club. National Chaplain, Kim Villalva, served as the Mistress of Ceremonies for the event.

Guests at the event received a copy of the book, *Empowered Women: Ohio Women in the Military* by Kim Villalva, as they listened to the powerful stories of the honorees. From being a trailblazer to confronting racism and gender discrimination, each woman veteran who spoke echoed the qualities of women who first began serving way back in the Revolutionary War. Even then as laundresses, camp followers and nurses, the story of women in the military began as a story of bravery, dedication, and perseverance.

And we see compelling story after story throughout history, throughout wars and conflicts, that demonstrated the strength and resilience of our women in the military...even when women were not






EMPOWERED WOMEN

from the National Historian...

As I looked back on the 1921 Proceedings, I saw no mention of the aftermath of the Spanish Influenza February 1918 - April 1920.



U. S. Public Health Service Begins Na tion-wide Health Campaign. The Auxiliary had suffered sickness and had lost members and family members to this monstrous epidemic. With no vaccine to protect themselves or their loved ones against influenza, and no antibiotics to treat the secondary bacterial infections associated with it, they were practically helpless.

People were limited to non-pharmaceutical interventions such as wearing masks, isolation or quarantine, good personal hygiene, use of disinfectants, limited travel and public gatherings — all of which were applied unevenly throughout the nation. The human

population had little to no immunity against the virus so it spread rapidly, killing over 50 million world-wide. It targeted the very young and



elderly but, there was also a high mortality in healthy 20-40 year-olds who succumbed to the disease.

However, what I read was pleasantly surprising. Our sisters were resilient. They worked through a World War and the epidemic. Their membership rose! They conducted a

membership drive with a net gain of 1,124 new members in one year and the president cited a goal of having 30,000 Auxiliary members by the next encampment.

An Honor Roll was created by the National President for Auxiliaries making a gain of 33%. The Fryer Banner went to Greenville, Ohio which was organized with a Charter list of 141 new members. Many of the Sisters travelled in groups to participate in the National Convention: reporting their activities in their communities, donation and charitable works, learning more about the Organization, and partaking in camaraderie with the Allied Orders.

It was also noted that the National Commander-in-Chief of the Sons allowed an article to be printed in *The Banner*, titled "Our Auxiliary." This article brought a great many inquiries to areas where no Auxiliary existed and some Auxiliaries were sponsored/formed with local camps.

Can we take lessons from our Sisters from 100 years ago and emulate their passion to grow the Order and carryout the principles of the Auxiliary? Because these brave Sisters acted on their goals, we can speak of belonging to a great Organization. They didn't let it die in spite of their crosses in life. If we each try to recruit new members this year, find ways to carry out the Principles of our Order (perhaps even come up with new ways and ideas), and attempt to attend the National Convention, think how strong we can be.

from the National Graves Registration Officer...

As the weather started getting a little warmer in Michigan (which is still barely above upper 30's during February – March), I gathered names and dates off Civil War veteran's headstones in order to

then search for their service records. The six cemeteries totaled about 10 acres of land and were established early in the 1850s with several beautiful designs and carvings in the stone above the graves of our "Boys in Blue." What impressed me is that caretakers had taken advantage of the early warm weather and already cut grass and trimmed shrubs. How nice it was to witness the care taken to honor those who made our country what it is today!



One cemetery had tree crews cutting down old, dying oaks and maples. How sad. The shade of those old trees will be missed come summertime, but sadly where the trees had fallen and broken some headstones, there will be some Civil War veterans missed.



Many cemeteries can't direct decendents to where their relatives are buried because fires destroyed the original records.

Without a permanent record of the Civil War veterans, in a matter of years after more wear and damage to the existing headstones, no one will be able to tell who lies beneath those illegible, broken, and missing markers.

For those who would like step-by-step instructions from start to finish of how to register Civil War veterans, there will soon be recorded instructions that can help. Our Brothers are excited to have us assist them. We will need as many sisters as possible (in all At Large, Department, and local Auxiliary levels) to understand and be proficient in this graves registration program. Many Auxiliary Sisters, in years past, would write a poem to strengthen sentiment attached to their report. Reminiscent of that, here is my try at what was done nearly 90 years ago.

They gave their full devotion to a true and noble cause, Let us bow our heads, remember them; and pause.

As years pass by, without our help, and gravestones we neglect, Forgotten by all those who pledged their memory would reflect.

So rededicate to strive and work before it's far too late. To gather each and every; All their names and dates.

Not do this task, would be not just have sorrow and feel regret, It's for the selfless "BOYS IN BLUE" we said we'd NOT FORGET! -ch/03/22/2022



TELLING THEIR STORY...

Two requisites for the survival of any volunteer organization are sufficient funds and sufficient members.

One activity, which has been found quite helpful in both fund raising and recruiting is public speaking. We all like to talk about what we've learned about the Civil War, our ancestors, and our patriotic activities. Some organizations have formed a speakers' bureau to draw attention to this service. When members ask themselves what they could sell or provide that would be of any value and



that others would pay for, the answer is simple...knowledge! Knowledge of the Civil War, the lifestyles



of those who lived and fought during that time, and afterwards, the Grand Army of the Republic.

If you're willing to share your knowledge and can speak clearly and enthusiastically about it, you're on your way to speaking publicly for a fee. If other sisters and brothers are able and willing to do the same, you have the makings of a speakers' bureau. With some publicity, you and your Auxiliary can have a source of income from speaking honorariums.

Of course, the other benefit is putting the name of your organization before the public in a very positive way. While

speaking to a receptive, target audience, your message about your Order's patriotic public service will be attractive to like-minded individuals. The idea of joining kindred spirits will be fruitful...but you have to get started planting it now!


Mrs. Mary E. Mason, 4th **National President**

Mrs. J.S. Mason was elected

the National President at the 5th National Encampment, held in Minneapolis on August 9-10, 1892.

Mrs. Mason was born Mary Evaline Allen on November 24, 1845, in Brunswick, Ohio. She was the eldest of four children born to Hiram and Lucy Blanchard Allen. When she was two years old, she and her parents moved to Medina Ohio. Her mother died in 1863 and her father remarried in 1869.

She married Joshua Seymour Mason, a printer, on December 31, 1868, and the two moved to Cleveland, Ohio.



Mary and Joshua soon moved back to Medina and had one child, Joshua Ezra (1878-1943).

Joshua, Sr., a prominent merchant in his community, was a member of Medina's H.G. Blake GAR Post 169 and served four terms as post commander. He also "commanded" the 17th Brigade, which was a reunion association. In 1893-94, he served as Department Senior Vice Commander.

Mary was described as a faithful, consistent Christian, a woman of pleasing personality, great natural refinement and culture. Her unselfishness and an earnest desire to be of service made a host of friends in all walks of life.

By 1885, Mary had become very active in the Order of the Eastern Star. She was elected Treasurer of the Grand Chapter of Indiana and four years later, was elevated to Grand Matron.

However, Mrs. Mason was constantly reminded of the war's cost to her permanently injured veteran husband and his family. She became a member of the Ladies' Aid Society early in its history. In 1887, Medina's LAS #13 was installed in her home. She was a charter member and served as its first chaplain. In 1888, her society sent her as a delegate to the Division Encampment at Sidney, Ohio. There, she was elected to the Division Council and as a delegate to the Second National LAS Encampment, held at Wheeling, WV. She returned to the Ohio Encampment in 1889 with an excellent report. Mary was President of her home Society when she was elected Division President at the 1889 Encampment. In June 1890, at Mansfield, Mary was reelected the Ohio Division President.

It was clear that the Woman's Relief Corps was still uncomfortable with the term "Auxiliary." Five years earlier, LAS National President Laura Miller had addressed the term as it applied to the LAS in a circular. In September 1890, Mrs. Mason spoke to the 17th Ohio Brigade Reunion (of which her husband was commander). She said:

"From the relations we sustain we should here find our friends. I am sorry to say we have enemies; but no excuse can be offered for ours. The Sons of Veterans fraternity is now an established fact. They, therefore, have an Auxiliary. All societies have kindred organizations. Should a vast order, numbering 125,000, abstain

from the restraining influences of the gentler sex. The Ladies' Aid Society may become the barometer which shall indicate the moral position of the Sons of Veterans. But we are always ready to lend a hand to the Relief Corps. They have their hands full, and they cannot divide their interest. We do not desire to interfere with them, but to assist them and when they lay down the mantle to wear it with grace. The existence and growth of one order proves its necessity. We now have 6,900 members. I am grieved because of the resolutions adopted by the Ladies' Relief Corps at the Boston assembly. The stand taken reflects no credit upon them. We desire to aid the Relief Corps. But no matter as to our treatment, we will continue to do our part. They need not fear us, we are only a spoke in the great wheel."

At the 1891 National LAS Encampment in Minneapolis, it was noted that there were 4,249 sisters in the Order, a gain of 1,216 over the previous year. There was over \$1,000 in the treasury and an increase from four divisions to nine. Upon being elected National President, Mrs. Mason appointed Mrs. A.P. Davis Chaplain-in-Chief.

By the time of the 6th National Encampment, the Order had grown to 8,000 Sisters in 250 societies and ten divisions. Mary was presented a handsome Past President's badge at the end of her first term.

Mary had joined the Woman's Relief Corps, presumably to improve relations between the WRC and the LAS. In 1892, Mary was elected Senior Vice President of Medina's Hamlin Woman's Relief Corps.

Mrs. Mason was re-elected at the 6th National LAS Encampment, held in Helena, Montana, on August 9-10, 1892. One newspaper reported, "She showed the same sound judgement and remarkable executive ability, which she had previously shown. Keen to perceive, quick to decide, yet cautious withal, prompt to act, and keeping abreast of the times on subjects of the day. Despite her LAS responsibilities, she found time for Church and family. Her gentle Christian character permeated all of the work and her administration."

One of the highlights of the second term was a receiving line at the Capitol rotunda in which Mrs. Mason participated with Mrs. John Logan, Miss Clara Barton, the heads of the WRC and Daughters of Veterans, as well as the wives of many of the heads of state.

In 1893, at the end of her second term, she was presented an elegant five-pointed star with diamond center. She was elected National Treasurer.

Joshua died on May 14, 1898, and Mary filed for a widow's pension that July. Joshua Jr. finished his 3rd year at Oberlin College and continued to live with his mother while working as an assistant bank cashier.

Mary died quietly on January 24, 1914, and was buried in Medina's Spring Grove Cemetery.

A MESSAGE FROM THE PROVOST MARSHAL

"Dear Sisters,

Hello and greetings. As Provost Marshal of the Annual Remembrance Day I am often asked questions about the dress for the parade. This is the official policy on dress for the parade. All persons participating in the annual Remembrance Day Parade will be dressed in American Civil War era attire or Grand Army of the Republic uniform. Military uniforms worn will be either Union or Confederate military originals or reproductions or Grand Army of the Republic originals or reproductions. Civilian attire of the mid 1800's is acceptable. Footwear must be appropriate for the Civil War era uniform or dress authorized by this Order. Parade participants may not wear sandals, sneakers and similar modern-day footwear.



Only the following will be permitted to march in the annual Remembrance Day Parade in modern business suit or dress attire with the badge of their Order affixed: Brothers of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, Sisters of the Women's Relief Corps, Sisters of the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, Sisters of the Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War, Sisters of the Auxiliary to Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, Members of the Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States, Members of the Sons of Confederate Veterans, Members of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, Members of the Order of Stars and Bars, Members of the Order Confederate Veterans, and Members of the Order of Confederate Rose.

This means no jeans or sweat pants, sneakers or sandals. If I had to give a word of advice I would


